





Latest News About Battle Hill in Fort Ann, NY



When I read the headline “National Trust Buys Battle Hill” by Bill Toscano in the Thursday, September 15th edition of the *Glens Falls Post-Star*, I thought to myself, “Dale Grinnell (a fellow WCHS board member) must be grinning from ear to ear!” Dale, along with members of the

Fort Ann Historical Society, as well as the American Legion Post in Fort Ann, has been working to preserve Battle Hill for many years. This property was the site of the Battle of Fort Ann during the Revolutionary War. At last, the site was going to be purchased by the Civil War Trust and preserved as an historical site.

In 2012, the WCHS had hosted a round table discussion at Fort Ann Central School with Revolutionary War historians, re-enactors, and the owner of the Battle Hill property, Gino Vona, on the panel. Over 150 people attended the event. Attendees had the opportunity to ask questions and voice concerns. After the round table event, the interested groups continued to work to save the area that had been the battlefield, while Vona wanted to work on setting up a mine at the site. The Civil War Trust, according to the *Post-Star* article, decided to acquire the property after Vona expressed interest in selling the property last spring when he realized his plan to open a mine on Battle Hill was not going to work out.



A grant was also received earlier this year from the American Battlefield Protection Program. This grant will help determine the borders of the battlefield and help develop a preservation plan. According to the *Post-Star*, “A survey of the property done by a team from the Public Archaeology Facility at Binghamton University, through another grant from the American Battlefield Protection Program of the National Parks Service, found that the battlefield is larger than first thought. The survey also determined the battle was more important than previously thought and called the mine proposal a threat to the historical nature of the site.” It is hoped that the area will become a tourism site with ownership eventually going to the Town of Fort Ann. The *Post-Star* states that the closing will take place on May 1, 2017.

The members of the Fort Ann Historical Society and the American Legion should be proud that their efforts laid the groundwork for the preservation of Battle Hill. To again quote the *Post-Star*, “After 239 years, the fight for Battle Hill is over.”

Membership Dues to Change in the Upcoming Year

One issue that has been discussed by the Board of Trustees has been the increasing costs of membership benefits. Over the past three months, the board has discussed, researched, analyzed, and finally have come to a decision on membership dues. Our past President and current trustee, Keith Truesdale, researched the current costs of a member's benefits. These costs include the WCHS *Journal*, four quarterly WCHS *Newsletters*, and membership cards. The cost of each member's benefits to the organization is \$15.22, which does not include our administrator's time spent on processing, postage, and travel to the mailing vendor to mail the items. Most of our membership is in the retired individual category and dues for that category have been \$15. Because of the increasing costs of running the Wing-Northup House, the Heritage Research Library, employee costs, and general administrative costs in running a library, plus that of the increased cost of benefits, we came to a hard decision to raise membership dues. The dues for next year will be as follows:

We have made this increase to the above levels with the thought that a dues change would not become necessary again for several years. It is a decision that was not done lightly, as many of our members are on fixed incomes, but we also know that members want to contribute to the on-going work of our organization. Notes from the Heritage Research Library—August

I have just returned from a vacation on Cape Cod. Last year I vacationed in Boothbay Harbor, Maine. A few weeks after I returned, a couple who was tracing a genealogy back to Boothbay Harbor visited us. So I expect that in a few weeks that at least one visitor, tracing his or her genealogy back to Barnstable, Massachusetts, will arrive. Because I used to live on Narragansett Bay, Rhode Island, and Westport, Massachusetts, I can easily visualize where many of our researchers' ancestors migrated from. It is a beautiful area, but small. It is not surprising that many who settled here can trace their ancestors back to Rhode Island.

In September, I will be attending the Family History Conference in Syracuse. This year the APHNYS – Association of Public Historians of New York State – will be meeting with us, but attending programs designed specifically for them. This fantastic event is extraordinarily well attended. One of the sponsors is the William G. Pomeroy Foundation. Mr. Pomeroy sits at his sponsor table and is most approachable. He offers funds (which we have received) for the purchase and production of historic markers. His new project is to provide funds for markers narrating historic stories (or myths) about places. The speeches given and references recommended during last year's program are on a disc at the Heritage Research Library.

Book Reviews – Two from Whitehall

Civil War Diary - Kept at End of the War January 1866 to October 1866, by Doctor Henry Root A.M., M.D. from Whitehall at Orangeburg, S.C., Transcribed by Ray and Joan Brown. Henry Root was born in Granville, in 1835. He attended Williams College. He studied law with Dr. Daniel Wright, Whitehall. He graduated from the University of New York and studied medicine in Europe. Among the highlights of the Diary: he built houses and hospital buildings in South Carolina where he had purchased land; he owned an alligator (that went missing); he was insulted by a soldier; only his religion kept him from taking revenge; and the rebels did not care for him, the freedman respected him. The following are some bits and pieces (with regularized spelling edits) from the diary:

Wednesday, January 10th, 1866

The scarcity of apartments for freed sick people leads me to think that I ought to have some houses built for them. Colonel agrees to furnish labor and nails, and glass. I will furnish the rest and own all I pay for.

Sunday, January 28th, 1866

Vaccinated nine freed people; examined the compound fracture of forearm in hospital; attended to the reports from some small pox patients in the country and went to express where I received \$416.35 from Major Salisbury as my pay for Nov. & Dec. Lent Meany \$5. Inclosed Chk. Of 216.35 to L. Myers to 48 Wall St. Visited small pox house where a soldier has had the loathsome disease in a severe type for four weeks. It is a pleasure to be able to render some service to such cases.

Friday, March 30th, 1866

The rebels are busy about any business but not so busy about the good of community.

Monday, April 2nd, 1866

Quite a panic has occurred on account of rebel threats to drive me out of my houses. Offence giving clothes to the Negroes.

Whitehall, New York in the Civil War, compiled by Carol Senecal, Historian, 2015. This book is a collection of all kinds of material in one volume. Some of the contributors to this volume are Doris Morton, Martin Kelly, and Gary Hart. The following is an excerpt from two letters, one from Louisa Snyder to Orville Robinson and the other his reply:

Dear Orville (who was camped on the Potomac),

Do you know who just came home? Silence Beman. She's been gone almost a year. Everybody thought she'd run off with John Bartholomew. What really happened was John joined one of the Indian regiments, and Silence followed him. She dressed as a man, joined the army, and was soldiering all this time! But she says John was a coward and she became disgusted with him, so she stayed on awhile, fighting, and then got tired of that, told the officers she was a woman, and left! Isn't that romantic?

Dear Louisa,

I'm glad Silence Beman had sense enough to return to her proper Sphere and live like a rational creature. Soldiering's no place for a woman, although I've heard of them doing it—always with a sad ending. There was one, Emily something, a New York girl who thought she was Joan of Arc. Her family took her to a doctor, but he could do nothing with her and recommended they take her to Massachusetts to keep her farther away from the armies. But she was so bad, the family had to lock her in her room. She escaped anyway, and joined the army, and fought, and got hit in the chest with a musket ball, and it was only when they brought her into the hospital that they knew she was a woman, but it was too late then; the wound was fatal.

One of the photos in the book is of drummer Co. B N.Y. Artillery, Alonzo Fayette Baker, born October 4, 1848, died Fort Corcoran October 4, 1863. He is buried in North Granville.

Both of the books provide much information for the historian; they are also interesting as they convey history.

I hope to see many of the members of the Society at the Annual Meeting. Thank you to all who support the Society in any way.

Successful Week at the Washington County Fair 2016

The WCHS ran its own booth in the County Bounty building at the Washington County Fair for the second year. This year the booth focused on selling all the books in our stock, including our informative cemetery books.



For those of you who are not aware of this resource, we have cemetery books available for several towns (Argyle, Cambridge, Dresden, Putnam, Easton, Fort Ann, Fort Edward, Greenwich, Hampton, Hartford, Hebron, Jackson, White Creek, Kingsbury, Salem and Whitehall). They are very helpful in genealogical research. This year, our slideshow at the fair focused on prominent Washington County citizens, including Susan B. Anthony and Chester A. Arthur. An 18 month calendar was developed using pictures from all seventeen towns in Washington County.

The fair was a success for WCHS in many ways. Our book sales more than doubled last year's. The Society's membership was increased through a fair special membership deal. Also in our first year creating and selling calendars since 1984, we sold more than two hundred and fifty dollars worth of calendars.

The Caboose also saw many visitors this year. Attendance for the entire week was 9,108. A hands-on area was created especially for children. There was a wooden train that they could run around a track, also crayons and coloring books that occupied them while their parents enjoyed the rest of the exhibit. This year, Dale and Coral Grinnell organized things according to the town that was featured in the photographs. It made for a very cohesive and interesting exhibit.

The WCHS wants to thank Dale and Coral Grinnell and Mary Lou Gravlin for finding the members and non-members to man the booth. It took a great deal of man power to keep the County Bounty and the Caboose open for seven days of the fair. WCHS would also like to thank Millie Mizerak as well as Coral and Dale Grinnell for organizing the Caboose, hanging the pictures and posters to make it comfortable for the many children and families who came through it during the fair. We would also like to thank Bob Kuba, Debi Craig, Millie Mizerak, Dale Grinnell, Coral Grinnell, Steve Lapham, Barb Anderson, Justin Culligan, Claudia Blackler, and Pat Niles for helping to setup, take down or both. Finally, WCHS would like to thank the people who volunteered at our booth; without your assistance we could not run the Caboose and the County Bounty booth.




Many of the small towns in Vermont had amazing exhibits. There was so much to see and do that she stayed almost five hours. There were also demonstrations of Colonial crafts, music performances, re-enactors, vendors, and much more. There was also a wide selection of food on-site.

It was during this first visit that Debi had an idea! "We could do this on a smaller scale in Washington County!" The first WCHS History Fair took place in 2009 at the Historic Salem Courthouse, in 2011 at Greenwich Central School, 2013 at Granville Elementary, and at Salem Central School in 2015.

Debi has now attended five Vermont History Expos either by herself or with fellow board member Millie Mizerak. The History Expo is held every other year. The next one will be in June 2018.

The next WCHS History Fair in Washington County will be September 30, 2017 at Hartford Central School. Please save the date! The theme will be "Forts and Battles" (of all kinds!).
